PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE by Joanne Kwasniewski, 2011 President



I am sure you are as tired as I am of this winter weather. I cannot wait for spring and to leave the snow behind.

It has been a busy first quarter for MCANJ. New Jersey once again hosted the IIMC Region II Conference meeting in January at the Trump Taj Mahal, Atlantic City and it was a resounding success. The focus was on Ethics and the two speakers were amazing. It seems that it is not only New Jersey that has ethical dilemmas facing our politicians. As we learned through an interactive session, the big questions are easy. It is the small issues that are the difficult ones. Not everything is black and white which often makes it difficult to choose the ethical path. Everyone agrees that it is unethical to take a bribe, but using your PBA card to avoid a ticket wasn't so cut and dried. It was a great conference.

Proposed legislation has been coming out of Trenton at a pretty fast pace. Senator Weinberg released a substitute bill S-1351 regarding the Open Public Meetings Act (OPMA) and S-1352 regarding OPRA. I was contacted by the NJ League of Municipalities and provided them with our concerns on the OPRA bill. I also sent Senator Weinberg a copy of the letter detailing our concerns. The concerns I enumerated are too lengthy to include here but I particularly stressed our dismay at the shrinking of the time to respond to OPRA requests. I was also dismayed that many of the items Past-President Buttiglieri, MCANJ Legal Counsel Lustgarten and I raised at our

meeting with Senator Weinberg last year were not addressed in this substitute bill. I sent Senator Weinberg a two-page email with MCANJ's concerns on the OPMA bill which among other things changes adequate notice to three days and prohibits discussing any item that is not listed on the agenda for which notice was given three business days prior to the meeting. If the public think it takes too long to get anything accomplished in government now, this bill will only make it worse.

S-923, which may even be signed by Governor Christie by the time you are reading this, grants the Director of the Division of Elections the authority to modify and supplement existing elections processes to accommodate municipal levy cap referendums. S-2718 establishes certain criteria for public employee health care benefits plan and requires premium percentage based employee contributions. The contributions are supposed to be based on premiums and not salary but the percentage of the premium to be paid is based on salary.

Everyone needs to be vigilant concerning these bills as they will have a profound effect on all of us. I will continue working with NJSLOM as they too express their concerns on these bills. The League has requested a meeting with the sponsors of S-1351 and S-1352. In addition, they have raised technical concerns with the Governor's Council Office. Please reach out to your legislators and express your concerns.

I appeared on a panel at the recent NJSLOM's program "Executive Leadership Training for Mayors and Council Presidents" presenting practical guidance regarding meetings and agendas. Treasurer John Mitch and 2nd Vice-President Nancy Saffos were presenters at the Seminar for Newly Elected Officials. The more that our elected officials learn about what we really do and how we can help them, the better it is going to be for all us.

Registration forms were mailed for the 2011 Education Conference which is scheduled for April 4-7. The Committee has done a great job putting together an excellent conference. Please join us.

GOOD NEWS, GOOD NEWS AND LET'S WAIT AND SEE...

The good news is a letter opinion from August 2006 prepared by the Legislative Counsel to the Joint Legislative Committee on public employee benefits reform, good news on a recent GRC decision relating to a generalized OPRA request, and the "wait and see" relates to S. 1351 which proposes amendments to OPMA.

First the retirement benefits memo.

Years and years ago, I first learned in law school that there were constitutional prohibitions against the government interfering with contractual obligations. In the current debate relating to the Governor's insistence that public employees bear the brunt of pension reform and health insurance contributions, the above concept was somewhat lost in the shuffle. Many months ago, there was a brief newspaper article on this subject relating to New York public employees, but the issue really never appeared to catch fire.

In the August 2006 memo, a legal opinion was requested as to whether the Legislature could reduce retirement benefits that were provided for public employees pursuant to statutes establishing various State administered retirement systems (You may have already received a copy of this opinion). The opinion recites the United States Constitution Contract Clause provision that "no State shall....pass any....law impairing the obligation of contracts..." The analog provision in the New Jersey Constitution is essentially saying the same thing.

The law seems to be settled that pensions for public employees serve a public purpose and are not really a gratuity given by the sovereign pursuant to the sovereign's generosity. Essentially the law has evolved to the point that pension rights are to be protected on the theory that a State's promise of pension benefits represents an offer and when accepted by the employees is a protected right. New Jersey has treated this right statutorily by designating it as "non-forfeitable" relating to "vested members" of the various retirement systems.

The effective statutory date that sets forth these principles is January 5, 1997. Essentially, the opinion states, that after that date, vested employees cannot have their contractual rights altered. The opinion correctly states the three prong test to determine whether legislation has unconstitutionally impaired a contract. The first thing to decide is whether the legislation substantially impairs the contractual relationship. If so, does it have a significant and legitimate public purpose and finally is it based on reasonable conditions and reasonably related to appropriate governmental objectives?

In one of the cases cited in the opinion, the Court said that a State statute which impairs a financial obligation undertaken by the State may be constitutional if it is reasonable and necessary to serve an important public purpose, but the extent of the impairment is a relevant factor in determining its reasonableness. In the cited case, the Court concluded that if a State could reduce its financial obligations whenever it wanted to spend the money for what it regarded as an important public purpose, the Contract Clause would provide no

protection at all. Legislative counsel determined that applying those standards to legislation that has the effect of reducing pension benefits for those whose rights are non-forfeitable and have attached, it is apparent that the State would be impermissibly impairing the obligation of a contract to which it is a party.

Legislative counsel's ultimate conclusion was that a law that has the effect of detrimentally altering the retirement benefit of an active member or of a retired member would be unconstitutional and violates both the Federal and State constitution proscription against impairment of the obligation of contracts.

This opinion is certainly not good news for the Governor and the cases cited in the opinion (which is almost five years old at this point), appears to be "good law". However, before we conclusively rejoice that the cases cited in the opinion will be the prevailing authority in the current economic climate, we must be cautioned by what a U.S. Supreme Court Justice once said in another setting that "The Constitution should not be construed as a suicide pact."

The outstanding question today, of course, is whether given the economic hardships and the failure to properly fund the pension system, does a proposed change in contractual terms serve a legitimate public purpose and reasonably related to appropriate governmental objectives which in the end, is to preserve the very system itself?

We may have an inkling on the State Supreme Court's thinking when it decides the Abbott School Funding cases where the Court is faced with the issue of the constitutional mandate to provide a thorough and efficient education for New Jersey students with the State arguing that there currently just isn't enough money to provide the level of funding that may be required. If the Court decides that the constitutional mandate trumps the funding problems, it would seem that the same reasoning would preserve the integrity of the pension obligations. If however, the Supreme Court determines that the State Constitution should not be interpreted as a "suicide pact" and the lack of available money trumps the constitutional mandate for a thorough and efficient education, this reasoning may carry over to the detriment of public employees.

The second "good" is a case that was recently decided by the GRC in favor of a very respected Municipal Clerk. The case is Leto v. Borough of Franklin Lakes, Complaint #2009-11.

The OPRA request in this case, I am sure, occurs virtually on a daily basis throughout the State. The OPRA request was to view all complaints regarding services or personnel of the Borough for approximately two (2) years and a request to view all inspections of the duties and responsibilities of any elected or appointed official in any department of the Borough for a similar time frame including inspections and reports and dates given to the Council.

The Municipal Clerk advised the requestor that the request was overly broad and unclear and requested clarification. The requestor was uncooperative and therefore no additional specificity was supplied and the request was denied.

After reciting the general statutory mandate of OPRA, the GRC once again confirmed that OPRA is not intended as a research tool that individuals may use to force government officials to identify and siphon useful information. Rather OPRA simply operates to make identifiable government records readily accessible for inspection, copy or examination.

The GRC cited appropriate Appellate Division authority that opined that OPRA does not countenance open-ended searches of an agency's files.

Citing other Appellate authority, the GRC reiterated that a proper request under OPRA must identify with reasonable clarity those documents that are desired, and a party cannot satisfy this requirement by simply requesting all of an agency's documents. The very specific conclusion of the GRC citing the relevant judicial authority is simply stated as follows: Because the complainant's request for the records relevant to the complaint failed to seek specific identifiable government records, the complainant's request was overly broad and was therefore invalid under OPRA and the custodian did not unlawfully deny the complainant access to said records. I recommend that you obtain a copy of the Leto opinion and keep it as a handy reference in the event you receive an overbroad request.

The "wait and see": S-1351 is in the legislative pipeline and relates to amendments to OPMA. It adds to the definition of public body to include independent authorities, redevelopment entities, improvement authorities and quasi governmental agencies.

The bill also indicates that if a public body has established an internet site, announcements should be posted on it relating to public meetings. There are several problematic sections of the bill. One of them relates to the agenda. It indicates that the agenda shall set forth a brief description of the items to be discussed and the approximate dollar amounts of any contracts to be discussed or acted upon. This section is not terribly onerous but it goes on to indicate that a public body shall not act or discuss a matter that is not listed on the agenda for which notice was given three (3) business days prior to the meeting unless the exceptions of N.J.S.A. 10:4-9 exist. That section relates to matters of urgency and importance which could not reasonably have been foreseen.

Effectively this section would prohibit "add-ons" subsequent to the agenda notice unless they fall into the emergent category. We all know that there are always add-ons that need to be taken care of but that do not necessarily rise to the level of an emergency. If the law passes, extreme due diligence will be required to make sure that everything gets on the agenda that needs to.

The bill also has a section that prevents private communication between members of the public body during a public meeting. This would preclude cell phones, texting or similar technologies for communication. Presumably this section is to prevent private communications by public body members on issues before them or even from receiving input from the "outside" on a particular issue. While it is quite understandable that these private communications prevent the public from fully understanding what is going on, one would think that there would be pre-meeting communications on certain topics anyway. Ya think?

Additionally how do you figure out whether the cell phone use relates to a public issue rather than the current baseball scores or checking to see if your kids got out of gymnastics?

The bill also codifies notice requirements which have been judicially required under "Rice".

Another major issue in the bill is the requirement that if the public body possesses sound recording devices, the meeting shall be so recorded and be made available to the public either within two (2) weeks of the meeting or at least three (3) days before the next regularly scheduled meeting, whichever is sooner.

MCANJ has submitted comments to the proponents of S-1351. We will have to wait and see what its final version is.

SPOTLIGHT ON: MIDDLESEX COUNTY

21 Stories of Our Garden State; 21 Stories to say "We're Great"

Middlesex County, also known as the "Heart" of New Jersey, is located squarely in the center of New Jersey and stretches from the Rahway River south to Mercer and Monmouth Counties, and from Raritan Bay on the Atlantic Ocean west to Somerset County. The county is 318 square miles in size, has 25 municipalities which includes the City of New Brunswick, the seat of Middlesex County Government and includes extensive industrial, office, and residential areas.

Serving approximately 100,000 primary and secondary school students are 175 public schools, five County vocational-technical schools, and over 70 parochial and private schools. Middlesex County College, a two year education center for academic and technical training, was one of the first in the State. Graduate level studies are available at Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey. Located in Middlesex County are five main Rutgers campuses; Rutgers College, Cook College, Douglas College, Kilmer Campus, and the Busch Campus, Home of New Jersey College of Medicine and Dentistry. Adjacent to Cook College is the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station, a nationally recognized research center The Forrestal Campus of Princeton University is located in Middlesex County, with Princeton University's main campus nearby.



Middlesex County has been one of the fastest growing counties in the State, having an estimated population increase between 1970 and 1990 of 87,967 persons. Population is projected to increase to nearly 796,000 by the year 2010.

As population grows so must housing as evidenced by a 45.7% increase in housing units since 1970, including new homes and apartments. As of 1990, the county estimates that it now has 250,174 housing units. This is an average of 784 units per square miles. Firms relocating to Middlesex County bring jobs and people and offer the progressive developer various opportunities.


Middlesex County has five major hospitals with a total bed space of 1,900. They include John F. Kennedy Medical Center, Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital, Raritan Bay Medical Center (Old Bridge), Raritan Bay Medical Center (Perth Amboy), and St. Peter's University Hospital.

The Middlesex County Department of Parks and Recreation operates 18 county parks encompassing 6,600 acres. Thirteen of these parks contain active recreational facilities and five others are conservation areas or are being held for future recreational development. The County has acquired over 5,000 acres of open space through the Open Space Trust Fund, and an active farmland preservation program has preserved 3,400 acres. The Middlesex County Improvement Authority operates three golfing facilities: The 36 hole Tamarack Golf Course in East Brunswick, the Meadows at Middlesex in Plainsboro, and the Raritan Landing Golf Course in Piscataway.

County parks offer a wide range of excellent facilities, such as East Jersey Olde Towne, a collection of restored, reconstructed and replica buildings from the 18th and 19th centuries in Johnson Park. Popular programs are also featured, including "Playsin-the-Park" series at the Stephen J. Capestro Theater in Roosevelt Park. There are also numerous private recreational complexes in the County, including golf centers and courses.

Among the historic sites that dot the county are the Cornelius Low House, which is an outstanding example of Georgian architecture and serves as the County museum, and the Edison Memorial State Park built on the site of Thomas Alva Edison's Menlo Park Library.
